

Kochia

Kochia is a fast-growing, drought-tolerant weed that thrives in disturbed areas and is often one of the first weeds to emerge each spring. Its seeds require only a few hours of moisture to germinate and can sprout across a wide range of temperatures. Because of its long germination period and high seed viability, kochia can spread rapidly and become difficult to control once established.



Foxtail Barley



Foxtail barley poses a serious threat to wildlife and livestock. When the seed heads dry out, their sharp, barbed awns can become lodged in the noses, mouths, ears, and eyes of grazing animals, including deer, elk, pronghorn, cattle, and horses. These injuries can lead to infections, abscesses, and severe health complications. Hay contaminated with foxtail barley has little forage value. Dense infestations are often associated with disturbed soils and can be difficult to eradicate once established.

Yellow Toadflax

Originally from Eurasia, yellow toadflax is a highly competitive invasive plant that spreads aggressively in dry environments. It can displace native vegetation and reduce forage available to wildlife, particularly on important winter ranges for big game species. While some wildlife may occasionally browse the plant, it provides little value compared to the native species it replaces.

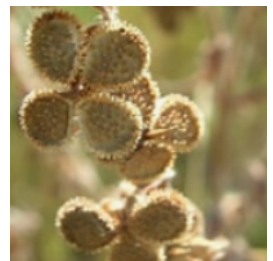


Spotted Knapweed

Spotted knapweed is one of Montana's most invasive weeds. It forms dense stands that crowd out native plants and reduce forage for wildlife and livestock. This plant is allelopathic and diverts nutrients from surrounding vegetation, giving it a competitive advantage. A single plant can produce up to 18,000 seeds annually, contributing to its rapid spread across more than 4.5 million acres in Montana.

Houndstongue

Houndstongue is easily recognized by its magenta-colored flowers and burr-like seeds that readily attach to clothing, pets, wildlife, and livestock. These seeds contribute to the plant's rapid spread. Houndstongue is toxic to both horses and cattle and can reduce the quality of grazing areas.



Hoary Cress (Whitetop)

Native to Eurasia, hoary cress was first documented in the United States in the early 1900s and has since spread nationwide. It develops an extensive root system that can reach depths of 30 feet.

The Hoary Cress is rhizomatous with roots that grow down and sideways allowing plants to form dense strands that outcompete native vegetation. A single plant can produce thousands of seeds each year, with seeds remaining viable in the soil for several years.

Hoary cress is also toxic to cattle.



Hoary Alyssum

Hoary alyssum is an invasive plant commonly found in disturbed areas, meadows, pastures, and hayfields. It grows one to three feet tall and has distinctive gray-green foliage. The plant is toxic to horses, whether consumed fresh in pasture or dried in hay. Hay containing significant amounts of hoary alyssum can cause serious health problems in horses.

Invasive Thistles

There are 5 invasive non-native thistle in Montana, at least two of these occur in our subdivision.

While some thistles are native and beneficial to pollinators, several non-native species are highly invasive, often spreading via underground rhizomes or taproots. These plants can form dense stands, outcompete native vegetation and reduce forage for grazing animals, including wildlife.

Many noxious thistles form a low rosette of prickly leaves in the first year and send up tall flowering stalks in the second year, sometimes reaching 3 to 10 feet. They reproduce primarily by seeds, which are extremely light and can disperse over long distances by wind. A single plant can produce hundreds to thousands of seeds, making eradication challenging.

Why Control Matters

Invasive weeds reduce forage for wildlife and livestock, displace native plants, degrade habitat quality, and can be costly and difficult to control once established. Early detection and removal are the most effective ways to protect our community's open spaces, wildlife habitat, and natural landscape.
